The College Parents' Advisory Committee (CPAC) would like to welcome all staff, parents and students for the new academic year of 2014. For our new parents, CPAC is an elected representative body of and by the parents and guardians of students enrolled at the Islamic College of Brisbane (ICB). It provides a forum for the parents to discuss issues which relate to and impact on their children. CPAC plays an important and integral role in the life of our College. It is a valuable link between parents and the College and holds regular monthly meetings with the Principal and other staff in a supportive and positive manner. The minutes of the meetings are published and this decision has been made in an effort to be transparent and accessible to the school community at large.

The objectives of the CPAC, as well as all its activities, fall under, and are guided by, the constitution of ICB, which emphasizes the importance of fostering an environment conducive to the development of well-rounded, responsible, and effective citizens. The current CPAC executive has accomplished various initiatives and some are highlighted below.

- Developed the Parent Connect initiative to improve ways of communication between parents and the College to address specific issues of concern at each grade level.
- Raised issues related to traffic difficulties and towards improvement.
- Raised considerable sums of money from the Annual Fete and other fund raising activities.
- Volunteered and coordinated various activities during Primary and Secondary sports carnivals.
- Coordinated with Brisbane City Council for Lord Mayor's Community Initiative funding.
- Managed and assisted in the tuckshop and helped in preparing tuckshop guidelines.
- Worked for uniform policy and solved the uniform related issues.
- Organized different family activities.

Our major fund raising event is the Biannual Fete which has become extremely popular in the Muslim community in Brisbane. On Sunday 9th June 2013, CPAC organized the fete with the help from teachers, students and school management. With 70 stalls spread over three levels this year's fete had something for everyone, and thousands turned up to sample the food, fun and entertainment. Many believe that it was the best CPAC Fete ever! Likely profit from this Fete was in excess of \$30,000.

In 2013 CPAC also allocated CPAC for various projects including:

- Contributing \$40,000.00 towards the cost of the first stage of digital projectors and cameras for the multi-purpose hall.
- Funded the library \$3,000.00 for the purchase of Islamic books and resources.
- Agreed to contribute \$15,000.00 for the installation of an artistic mural - a timeless and beautiful
- centrepiece mural depicting enduring themes intermeshed in Islamic and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander art, to be installed on the new building stage Inshallah.

Recommended funding for sports and playground equipment including:

Netball facilities - additions to existing basketball courts and cricket area
Purchase giant of checker sets for use in the Primary School playground.
Purchase three additional shade tents in sports house colours
Purchase 450 sports bibs in sports house colours for use at school sports carnivals.
Upgrade / rehabilitate Prep to Year 1 playground area including a new softball and seating area

As Chairman of the current committee, I would like to thank all the members the parents who have invested their valuable time and effort for the betterment of the College. The CPAC represents a great opportunity for parents to contribute to the College. The CPAC looks forward to hearing from parents regarding any ideas, initiatives, concerns, queries, or thoughts.

Our Annual General Meeting (AGM) is usually held the second week in February to elect a new executive along with other positions as needed. Parents are humbly requested to join the next AGM to form the new committee and contribute to the building of bright future of ICB.

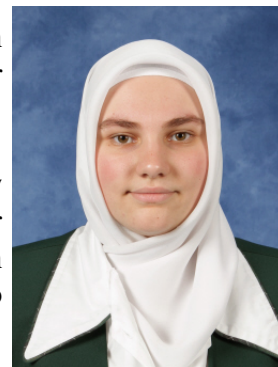

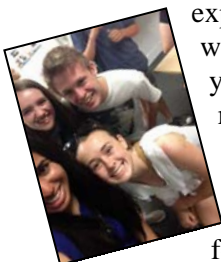
nities to work back stage at many Youth events, and it also gave me the opportunity to stand up and speak my mind about various issues which needed to be raised.

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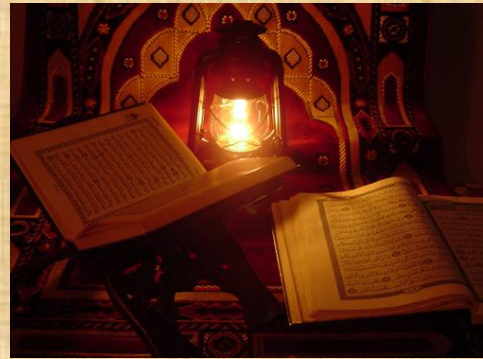
From the Imam's Desk...

Secondly we all belong to the human race and we are all the children of our father Adam alayhis salaam. When a fire breaks out anyone and everyone will stop to help and no one will ask what your religion is? That is because religion is irrelevant when humanity is in danger. Thirdly we belong to one brotherhood of Islam. The muslim body is like one body. If one part feels pain the entire body becomes restless. Fourthly we are one Ummah, the Ummah of Muhammad sallahu alahi wasalam.



The poet says so beautiful that if our Allah is one, our Prophet is one and our Quraan is one than why are we divided into so many different groups?

It is not possible for any two people including husband and wife to be a hundred percent compatible. We are bound to have differences and variation in opinion. However unity demands to have respect for one another and not allow our opinion and way to be an obstacle in keeping the peace and love.

Sahaba and Tabieen differed in many matters yet they were the closest of friends. Imam Shafee would pray the hanafi way when visiting the mosque of Imam Abu Hanifa out of respect and reference. They understood some things may be mustahab and virtuous, however to keep the love and respect is compulsory.

There is also no unity achieved in the disobedience of Allah. Love and understanding can only be achieved in the obedience of Rabbul Alameen.

A selfish person will find ninety nine reasons to disunite and an unselfish person will find just one reason to keep everyone together. If we separate a coal from the fire it loses all its heat and when we return it to the fire it burns strong again.

The secret of unity is to display a lot of compassion for everyone and everything. Rasulallah sallallahu alayhi wasalam showered mercy everywhere he went. Whilst he did not tolerate any disobedience to Allah he forgave peoples mistakes and said to his companions do not complain to me of anyone for I want to meet everyone in the morning on a good and pleasant note. He encouraged smiling, feeding and spreading of salaam. He said, "none of you are true believers until you love one another." He also said, "should I not show you what will bond your hearts? Exchange gifts with one another."

A saint was once asked how one knows when he is pious. He said "when a person thinks of himself as a sinner and others as pious." He was then asked how a person knows when he is a sinner. He replied, "when he thinks of himself as pious and others as sinners."

Today one of the major reasons why we are facing so many adversities and problems as an Ummah is because of our quarrels and inward fighting. We hate one another for trivial reasons. Respect for the elderly and mercy for the young has disappeared.



The plight of the Ummah

Rasulullah sallallahu alayhi wasallam said that before the Day of Judgement problems will pour on this Ummah faster than the beads slip out from a cut thread. Afghanistan and Iraq just seem yesterday and today it is Syria and Egypt. Whilst we go shopping for expensive brand name clothes for our children our brothers in these countries go out to buy their children burial shrouds. Whilst we may take our kids out on a Sunday to play in a park they carry their children in their arms to the graveyard. Whilst millions are displaced and hundreds of thousands are killed in Sham and Misr the land of the prophets is been drenched with the blood of this Ummah. Whilst these countries may make the headlines, thousands of cries of our mothers and sisters in Burma , Kashmir and Palestine remains unheard. In Burma alone more than forty thousand Rohingya Muslims were burnt alive last year. It is only wise that as an Ummah we unite and stand in solidarity against all this injustice inflicted upon our brethren around the world. However that starts right here with our attitude towards one another.

Alhamdulillah this year Ramadaan we were able to introduce to our students the importance of using the miswaak. All students in primary and secondary were given lessons regarding the importance of using the miswaak and demonstrations on how to use it properly. With the kind help of Al Imdaad foundation in South Africa we gifted every student his/her own personal miswaak. For hygiene purposes every miswaak was gifted in a plastic case designed to fit neatly in the upper pocket like a pen.

- It increases the reward of Salah.
- Miswak refreshes the mouth.
- Miswak strengthens the gums.
- It helps in digestion.
- Miswak improves the eyesight.
- Miswak improves the memory.
- Miswak cures headaches.
- It increases fluency & intelligence.
- It brings joy to the heart.

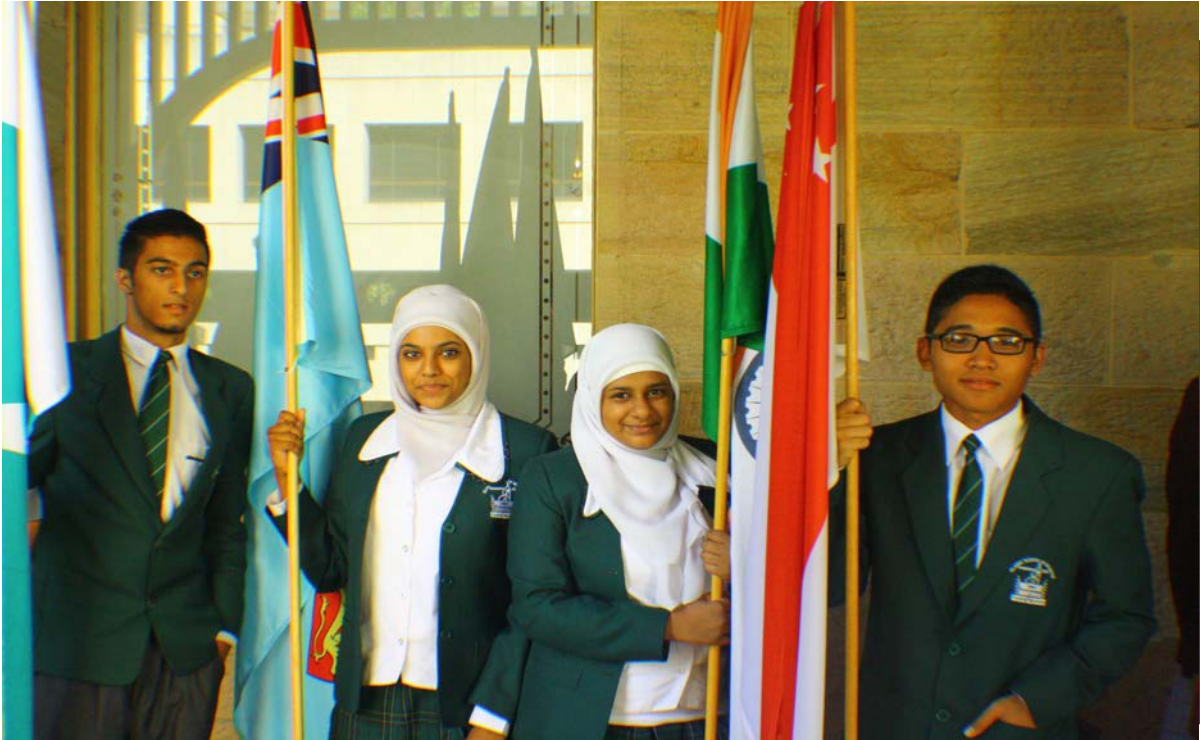

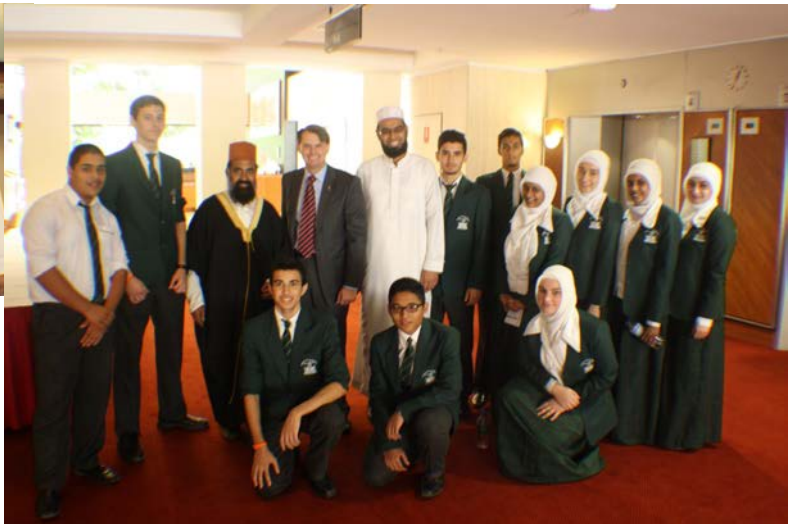

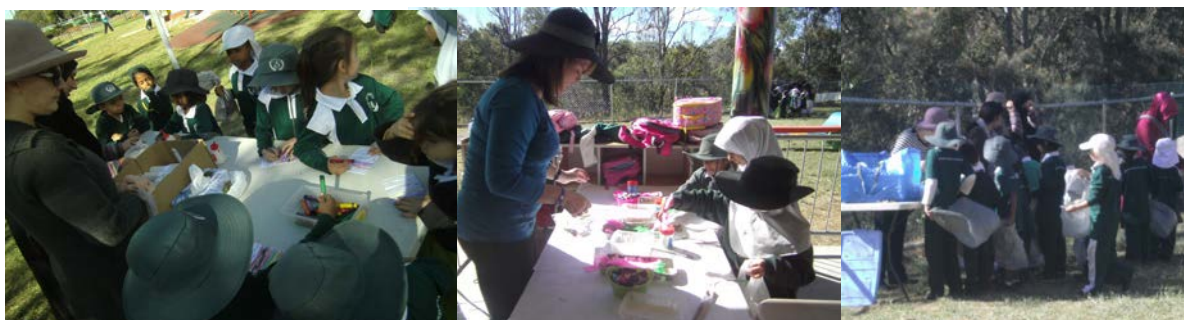


Under Eight's Day

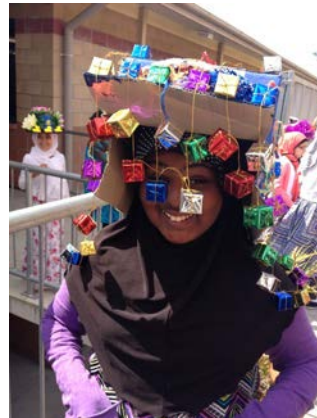
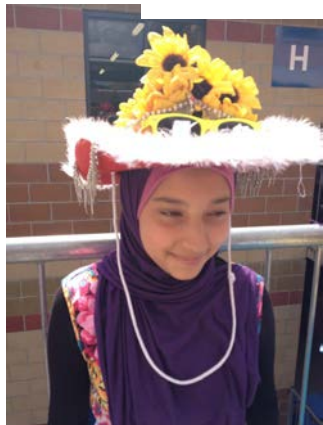
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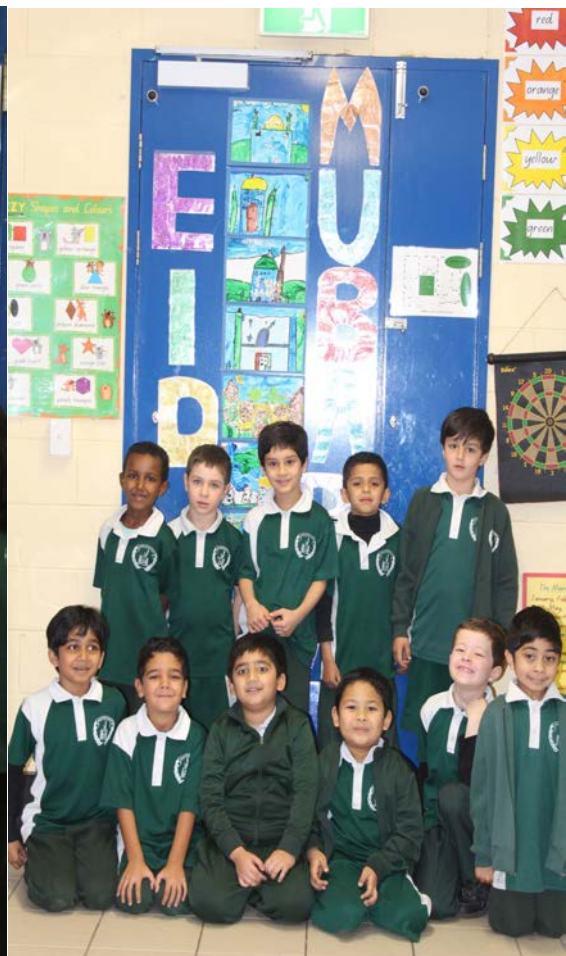


Eid and Ramadan decorations

Brisbane Writer's Festival 2013

On the 6th of September, a select group of ICB students attended the Brisbane Writer's Festival. While there, we met several distinguished authors, all of whom gave us some very useful advice about the writing craft and particularly the art of storytelling.

The first session took us to the Maiwar Green where Robert Hoge, talked to us about his recently released autobiography, *Ugly*. He provided an insight into his life of having to cope growing up with physical deformities. He spoke about how he handled being ridiculed and bullied in school, as well as how he accepted his imperfections, because nobody was perfect. We all learned something important from this seminar, particularly as he made us think about how we see ourselves.

Year 12 Biology excursion to QUT MERF

In the teaching/learning world, it is believed that in order to seek knowledge and understand certain material or ideas more effectively, visual aids are one of many very effective educational tools. For this reason, the grade 12 biology class of 2013 as well as their

beloved biology teacher Mrs Dean saw it befitting to visit the QUT MERF (Medical Engineering Research Facility) on the 13th of February. There, they were greeted by a lovely knowledgeable pathologist along with a not so lovely dissected, embalmed 64 year old lady. What better way to learn about the

human body and its organs than to analyse them for ourselves? We stood around the preserved body, dressed in the essential protective clothing, and watched, listened, winced and squirmed as the sternohyoid, sternocleidomastoid and trapezium muscles in the neck were pointed out and their functions explained. 64 year old lady, appeared damaged. By observing these unhealthy lungs, student were able to identify the damaging side effects of smoking and similarly by observing the unhealthy, fat covered heart (which was the cause of death for this particular patient), students were made aware of the importance of diet and lifestyle and were discouraged from eating fast food. Accordingly,

the visit to the QUT MERF was a very informative and worthwhile experience that year 12 students were glad to have attended (most of them) and were very thankful to their teacher, Mrs Dean, for having made the visit possible.

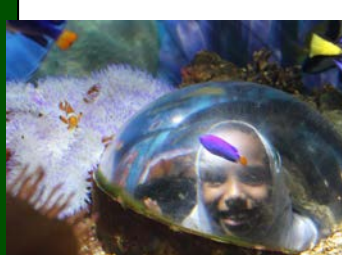

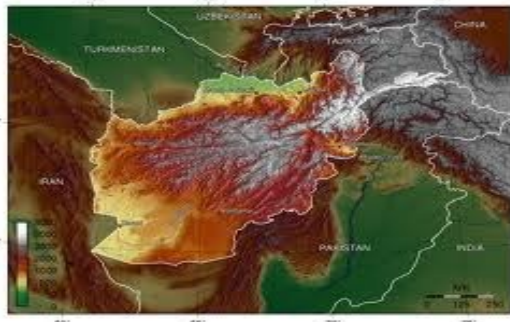

Secondary Cross Country 2013

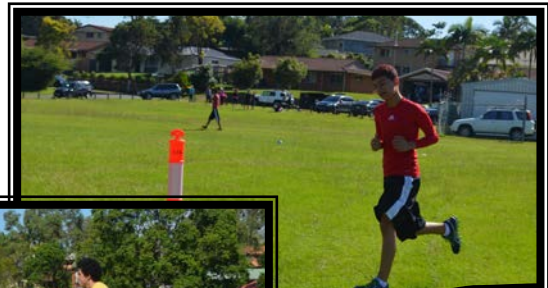

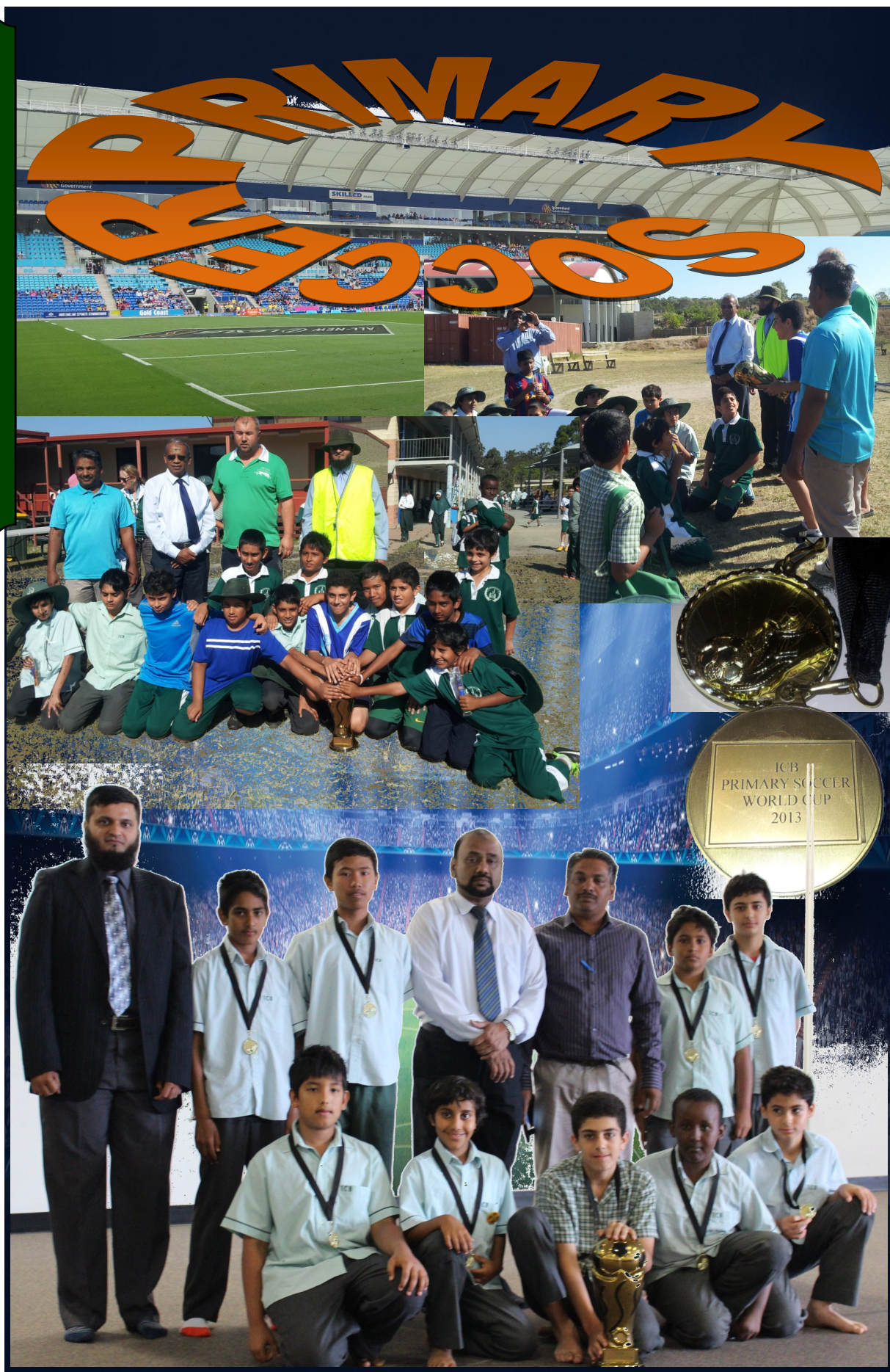

While most used the conventional method of a slalom style zigzag to descend the slope, some took a more direct route straight down, often reaching break-neck speeds before imitating a mini avalanche of poles, skis, arms, legs, and showering snow. Day two saw the more advanced skiers ascend the steeper inclines, watched with envy from below the ski-lift by those still practising the plough. By day three however, even the most hesitant beginners were displaying confidence and performing aerial jumps, though a few may need extra practice to perfect the landings, and there was a definite lesson that the proven track is often safer than the path less travelled, especially when fences are present. There is much satisfaction in the tired and sore feeling that comes at the end of a day of skiing but it wasn't just the physical exertion of activity that made this trip enjoyable. The bonding of the group as a whole as we shared new experiences, excitement and faced moments of fear together made this quite a special week. The final journey home was bitter-sweet, it had ended too soon but the memories will last a life-time. Everyone had got what they came for – the exhilarating experience of skiing on the slopes of Perisher and trying something new. A special thanks and acknowledgement must be made to those who created this unique opportunity at ICB and for those who worked immeasurably to ensure it happened.

ICB Students on ‘Street Retreat’

Students from the Islamic College of Brisbane (ICB) piloted a program to increase the level of civic engagement amongst Australian Muslim youth. This was achieved by dedicating an entire unit of the Year 12 Health Education course to the issue of homelessness.

Students signed up with Rosies ‘Street Retreat’ which offers a school outreach program, feeding and sharing time with our ‘friends on the street’. The students were first trained by representatives from Rosies. On outreach they distributed refreshments and blankets to patrons in the area and interacted with those less fortunate than themselves. The students, as well as the staff, were challenged by the experience and taken out of their comfort zones, as they engaged in conversation with the marginalised in society. The people they met enjoyed sharing their stories as well as a coffee or a soup with the students. It was rewarding to see the friendly interactions between the students and the patrons. Research suggests that Australian Muslim youth exhibit some of the lowest forms of civic engagement. Contrary to this, students from the Islamic College of Brisbane (ICB) have a proud history of civic engagement in a wide range of community endeavours. Islamic principles emphasise the importance of charity and helping those in need especially within one’s own community. Prophet Mohammad (SAW) once said that the person who sleeps full while his neighbour sleeps hungry is not a true believer. Taahirah Ali (Year 12), after participating in the outreach program, expressed: ***“It really opened my eyes to the seriousness of the issue. It gives you a greater appreciation for life.”*** The outreach proved to be a confronting experience for the students and provided them with a ‘lived education experience’, while simultaneously empowering them with the confidence that their Islamic values are relevant in the Australian mosaic. One of their intentions was to revive Muslims’ prominent role in community welfare in the local context, which will ultimately benefit the *Ummah*, *Insha’Allah*. Acting Against Bullying Project

This year marked the 7th year that the year 11 Health Education class has implemented the Acting Against Bullying (AAB) project at ICB. AAB is a successful, evidence-based, anti-bullying program developed by Professor Bruce Burton from Griffith University. The project adopts a whole school approach with student and teacher participation. It is a program designed to empower students at every level to manage bullying successfully; assist every member of a school community to understand the nature and consequences of bullying; and to feel competent to deal with the manifestations of bullying in their school.



This year we were fortunate to have the founder of AAB project Professor Bruce Burton from Griffith University to visit ICB and witness ICB's anti-bullying efforts. This year the AAB project involved year 8 and 10 students. The year 10s enjoyed peer teaching carried out by us, the year 11s and then passed their acquired knowledge to the year 8 students. Our lead role in exposing younger classes to the project has been extremely gratifying. Taking part in this project has been our efforts toward improved reporting of bullying and enhanced conflict management skills amongst the peer group at ICB. Our aim in running this project was to give students themselves both the understanding and some of the tools to deal with bullying and other forms of conflict in schools. Alhamdulillah, after running the AAB project, year 8 and 10 students had positive opinions about the way AAB was run and the knowledge they gained about bullying. Teachers were also a main part of the project where they engaged in the project and helped students in deescalating conflicts in the role plays.

"The AAB project was an enlightening experience that we all took something home from," Zahra Ali, Grade 8 student.

"It was a really great day. I learnt a lot of things from the AAB project such as the three stages of bullying. It was a fun and exhilarating day," Janat Zeba Nassiry, Grade 10 student.

"There was a great level of student participation and enthusiasm for the programme. The activities were well-organised and a culture of mutual respect was evident in the programme," Mrs Bakshi.

This year a new student position was introduced in secondary school along with other student council roles. This was the Acting Against Bullying Prefect position. Saleha Sayeef and Jayhed Chymasse have done a wonderful job in de-escalating bullying at ICB and supporting both the student body as well as working in support of Mr Sullivan in a number of initiatives. *Insha'Allah*, this *amanah* (trust) will continue to be placed with years 12 in coming

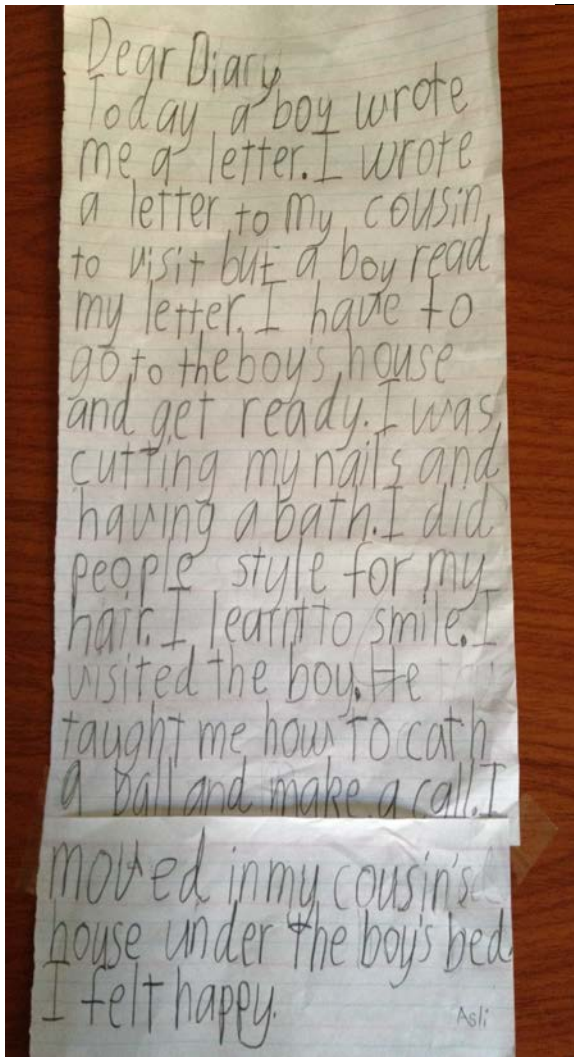

After the fire works I went on one more ride then we got ice-cream and slushy.

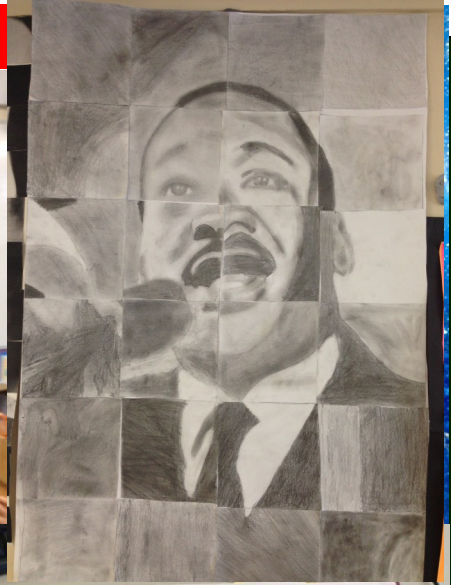
Then it was time for Samira to go home. I found my family and we got ready to go home and rest. Before we went home we played tigy with our family friends.

From the Head of ESL

What's new in ESL?

In 2014 the ESL department will be launching a new course for both local and international ESL students. **Courses developed from this syllabus will suit students for whom English is not their first or home language.** For the first time the year 11 students will participate in this course next year. This course is practically designed for ESL learners who would like to go to university with sufficient results in English.

This is titled as **English for ESL learners** and will help the students achieve the requirements of university entrance in most degree programs as far as English is concerned. This is an approved Queensland studies authority (QSA). In 2015 the grade 12 will be the first lot to go through this program at our school.

Queensland's senior syllabuses for *English* and *English for ESL Learners* are equivalent for tertiary admission purposes. While *English for ESL Learners* targets development of students' language knowledge and skills, its central focus is the same as *English*, namely the analysis and evaluation of language and texts by others, including literature, and students' creation of their own texts for a variety of purposes and audiences.

The Queensland Tertiary Admissions Centre, the agency responsible for decisions about entry to university courses in Queensland, considers that where *English* is a required or recommended prerequisite for a university course, *English for ESL Learners* is accepted as equivalent.

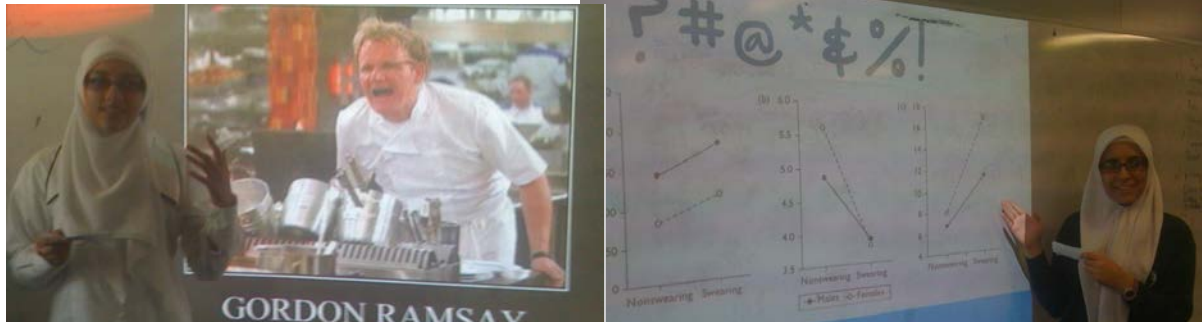
How the ESL classes are run at the college

Our ESL classes are composed of four macro skills which are reading, writing, listening and speaking. This is intended to assist *all* students of English as second language (ESL) learners at our school. Speakers of English as a Second Language often have special interests and require more extensive treatment of certain grammar-related topics, such as idioms, articles, and prepositions. Those interests and topics are best dealt with at our school in smaller groups by the ESL department.

In addition to teaching grammar and writing skills, the ESL department has a strong desire to improve the listening skills, vocabulary development, and pronunciation of students. Lessons are categorized according to skill level (beginning, intermediate, and advanced), and special programs have been developed for ESL teachers to incorporate in their ESL classrooms. As education moves into the 21st century with schools obtaining grants for the 'digital' revolution' so too has technology dramatically changed for new learning capabilities. Both teachers and students are becoming more familiar and flexible with the mode and method of learning experiences in the classroom with the use of iPods and iPads, thanks to the Independent Schools Queensland (ISQ). The ESL students in high school are tapping into the potential of learning to occur outside of school, which goes beyond regular revision techniques, by using technological tools as a suitable platform for this to happen.

As ESL learners currently understand, the average learning day for an ESL student is far more complex when learning and living in an English speaking environment. These learners need efficient and constant English teaching to ensure they maintain adequate levels of understanding in all of their subjects. By combining the ESL learners' needs and new technological advances, ESL learning and teaching can be more efficient and easily extended beyond the school day.

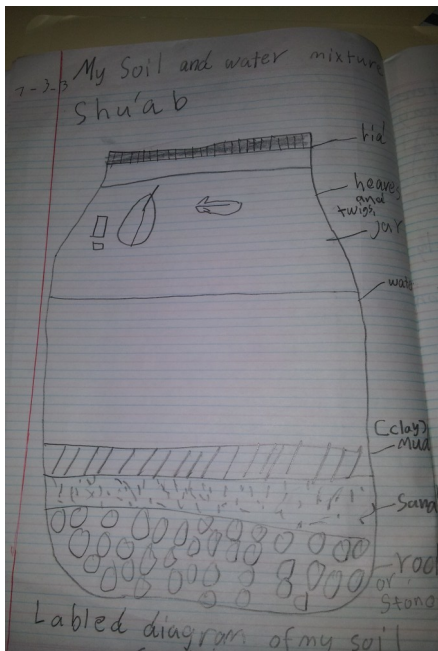

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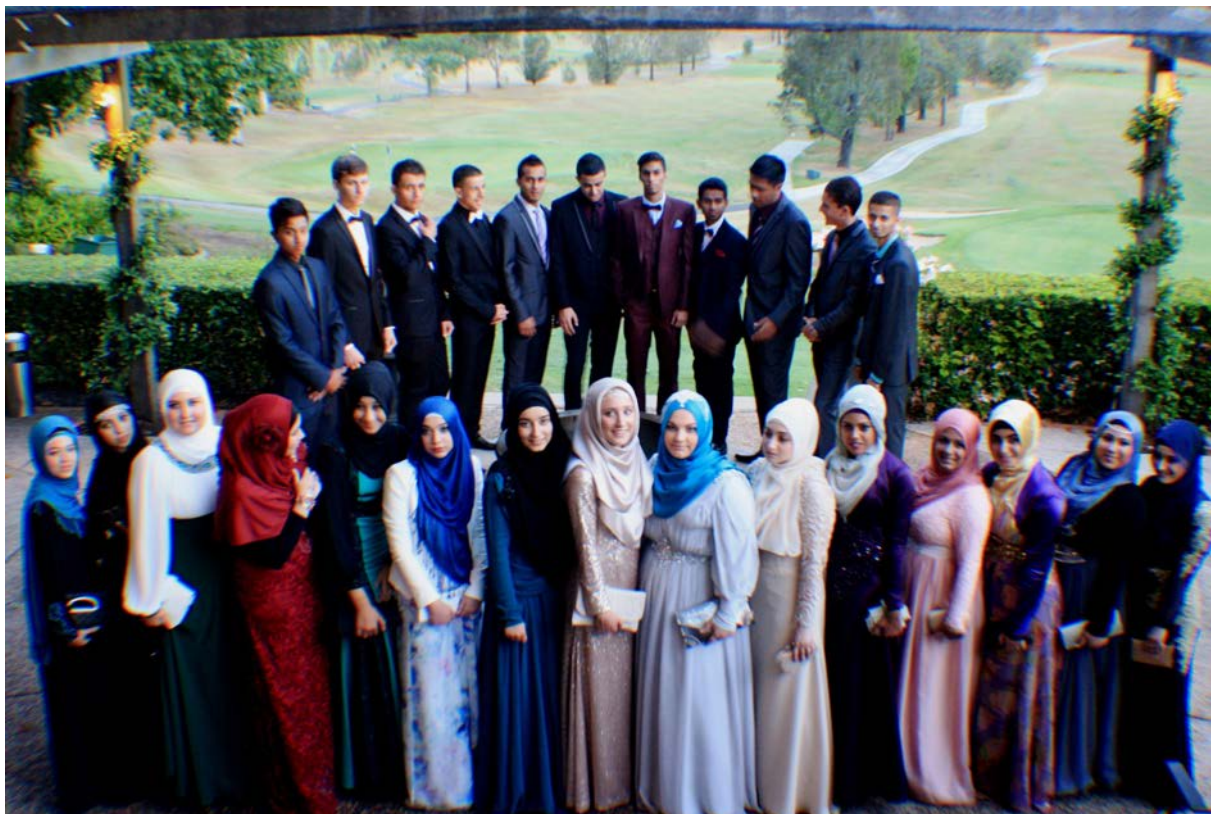
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
