MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD

Alhamdulillah 2010 has been an important and a memorable year for us for many reasons. The completion of the Multi- Purpose Hall has been the most important achievement. The students and the staff will be able to utilize the facilities for indoor sports and various other activities that were not possible so far. Also from now onwards we will be able to assemble the entire school in the hall for any event including the congregational prayers in the undercroft area. Moreover, the community now has a venue where they can meet, hold functions, conferences, etc. The hall has a modern canteen, cold rooms at both levels, lift and stage with remote controlled curtains, etc.. Insah Allah, other facilities will be added in due



course as funds become available. We acknowledge the generous grant of \$3m from the Federal Government that made this facility possible.

A further grant of \$200,000 from the federal Government enabled us to build covered walkways, upgrade the driveway, renovate demountable buildings, purchase smart boards, erect fences that were previously being hired and provide various other much-needed facilities. Apart from savings to the school, these facilities will benefit the students, teachers and the community.

Other projects undertaken during the year included the construction of new block wall perimeter fence along Acacia Road and installation of security cameras (funded by the Federal Government under the Secure School Program), installation of solar panels to contribute towards our electricity usage and purchase of new computers, which enabled us to now have separate computer labs for primary and secondary students.

After overcoming several hurdles, work is finally due to start on the new 12-classroom building which will cost about \$2.5m, of which \$1m is funded by the Federal and State Governments respectively and another \$400,000 by the Islamic development Bank in Jeddah. The balance is being contributed by the school. The completion of this building in early next year will Insah Allah, enable us to relocate all the students from the demountable buildings in the old campus to the new campus. This will then enable us to demolish all the old demountable buildings and make room for the extension of the car park, second access road and more pick-up/drop off points. This is expected to happen in the later part of 2011. Adjacent to this new building will be an undercover sports facility

Another major building project to be undertaken later this year will be the addition of another floor to the Admin Building to accommodate a new and modern library to be funded partly by government grants and partly by the school. This project is expected to be completed by March 2011. Whilst the major portion of the above capital costs have come from various grants the school had to contribute about \$2m to enable the projects to be completed. Although this has placed tremendous strain on our limited financial resources, the Management is conscious of the need to provide modern facilities and keep abreast of the developments around us.

The year 2011 will no doubt be an equally challenging one for us. Earlier this year AFIC invested just over \$2m in purchasing a block of land on Compton Road opposite our present premises. A master plan for this site is currently being discussed and this includes construction of a swimming pool and a technical trade centre, etc. We are going through an exciting phase of development and we invite the members of the community to be part of this process and to share your thoughts and ideas with us.

Once again I would like to express my sincere thanks and appreciation to the President and members of the AFIC Executive Committee, my fellow Board members, Principal and the staff for all their support and assistance. To all those who are leaving us, especially the students of grade 12, I wish you the all the best, and success in whatever you choose to do.

FROM THE PRINCIPAL



Assalaamu Alaikum WaRahmathullahi WaBharkathu

Now in its 15th year, The Islamic College of Brisbane continues to meet parent's high expectations for the achievement, discipline and personal wel fare of their children. The roll out of the school intranet and TASS -web (The Alpha School System) administrative database has helped accommodate the growth in enrolments to 835 students, without diminishing the focus on indiviual student needs and the importance of working in partnership with parents. The ongoing delivery of improved facilities and student programs has been in

conjunction with an emphasis on staff training, accountability and greater transparency across the College. To this end, the scope and responsibilities of teaching roles and efforts to engage with students, parents and the wider community have increased markedly over the years.

This process of review and improvement included the professional development of staff, 2010 saw a College wide approach to up-skilling teachers in regards to preparing students for the NAPLAN tests and implementing across the curriculum strategies for working with English as a Second Language (ESL) students. The majority of students continue to perform above the National average in the 3, 5, 7 & 9 in these bench mark tests. Further staff training and support was also provided to manage the transition to 'web based' school administrative and reporting procedures. This modernisation brings the College in line with 'best practice' school management and is a powerful tool in terms of school organisation and enhanced transparency.

Another important benchmark for the College are the Australasian, Rio Tinto, Westpac and ICAS academic competitions. Across the disciplines of English, Mathematics and Science our students achieved 12 High Distinctions, 88 Distinctions, 297 Credits and 24 Proficiency awards. Also in 2010, the College gave a good account of itself in the Islamic Council of Queensland's Quran Recitation Competition, achieving four first places, four second places and one third place across the various age groups including the overall winner for the competition.

Again, in 2009, all Year 12 students gained tertiary entrance qualifications with the majority of OP scores in the 1 to 15 range. We are looking forward to a similar or better Year 12 results in 2010. The beginning of 2010 saw Year 7 incorporated into the primary campus to take advantage of additional permanent classrooms made available through the completion of G Block and investment in new teaching resources and facilities for the year ahead. Although Year 7 was previously part of the secondary campus, increased student numbers and the preference for a core teacher at this key stage, made for pragmatic reasons to implement this change. This move allows for greater continuity in terms of teaching and learning across the formative school years, with particular emphasis on preparing years 3, 5 and 7 for the National Assessment Plan for Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) as evidenced in this year's Year 7 results.

In 2010 the College continued to enhance its anti-bullying and pastoral care initiatives through targeted year level workshops and activities. This was matched with new systems and documentation to foster greater accountability amongst staff and encourage responsibility amongst students. Building Resilience in Trans-cultural Australians and the professional development of staff through training sessions flowed on to a series of student workshops teaching students coping strategies and life skills relevant to their cultural backgrounds and day to day challenges. This pilot program is now apart of the Year 8 curriculum from this year. The primary campus has also made effective revisions and improvements to its behaviour management policy and the personal development of students.

The pastoral care of students is addressed through school wide programs and integrated into many of the teaching courses. Noticeable improvements have been made through greater expectations and accountability being placed on staff to use conflict resolution and responsible thinking approaches to student discipline, proven to work best in Australian schools. The pastoral care of students is supported by established documentation procedures, staff training and the use of an online database to manage and store student behaviour, punctuality and attendance records. These strategies provide the tools to work in partnership with students and parents regarding school discipline and organisation. Communication and collaboration are cornerstones of this process.

Improved student leadership and morale has evolved in line with this approach. Student elected and Principal vetted leaders now fill positions including male and female College Captains and Vice Captains; Senior Prefects, Year Level Captains and Sports Captains. Representatives from this group form the Student Representative Council (SRC); while Year 12 student leaders form the College's Senior Council, which acts as an executive committee on matters of student interest. The SRC works closely with key teachers to meet student needs and provide a forum for student views. Student leaders also act as ambassadors for the College, attending and speaking at prominent community events. Four of our students were also recipients of the Australian Defence Force student leadership awards in 2010. Other examples of student leadership and community involvement include our College's representation at the annual Amnesty International 'Activate' Human Rights conference and the annual commemoration ceremony of the at the newly erected Australian and New Zealand Army Corps (ANZAC) memorial garden in partnership with the Logan Returned Serviceman's League and Kuraby Lions Association. There is also ongoing connection between the Islamic College of Brisbane and the Queensland Independent Schools Days of Excellence program. This initiative provides opportunities for some of our brightest students to learn and interact with other high achievers from around the state. The Islamic College of Brisbane also continues to open its doors to other schools and colleges who wish to learn more about Islam. Three separate visits of this type were held in 2010 and guests were able to engage in dialogue with the Imams and students.

Other features of the College's co-curricular activities are the internal and representative sports programs. As well as compulsory lessons in Health and Physical Education, the College offers an after school option of a variety of sports such as soccer, touch rugby, volleyball and multi-sports for primary. A variety of inter-school sporting fixtures are run throughout the year, encouraging physical fitness, competitive spirit and teamwork amongst our students. Students who excel in these activities are nominated for selection in district and regional teams, and although none have been victorious at this very high level, such opportunities generate a great deal of enthusiasm for sport and boost the profile of the school. The College community is also looking forward to the new multi-purpose building complex being completed under the Prime Minister's Building on Education Revolution – Primary Halls of the 21st Century that will be officially commissioned in 2011.

In 2010 staff training and a refinement of administrative systems and practices lead to greater accountability and transparency throughout the College. This facilitated greater engagement with students, parents and the wider community. Ongoing confidence in the College's provision of both secular and religious education of the highest standards is evidenced by continued enrolment growth, academic achievement and investment in new facilities. In this context, the College's transition from a small school to a large institution is being carefully managed to maintain the depth and quality of the curriculum and evolve co-curricula programmes in line with current needs and expectations for the future.

I would like to extend my best wishes to the teachers, staff, parents and students for another great year.

HEAD OF SECONDARY REPORT

2010 began with its usual burst of activity. Naturally, the initial focus was on conducting student leader elections. With voting left in the students' hands, the senior leaders, year level captains and house team leaders were soon chosen. Some had more success than others in their role, but a culture of leadership, service for others and pride in the College is continuing to grow. Secondary students benefitted from a motivated team of House captains and vice captains this year, with many House leaders showing initiative and leadership on several occasions. Other student leader delegates commendably represented the College at events such as Commonwealth Observance Day at Queensland's Parliament House; AN-



ZAC Day; and through the interfaith dialogues with other colleges, facilitated by Head of Islamic Studies, Imam Zeeyad Ravat.

College Captains Momina Ahmed Allahwalah and Aymen Houadchia, were role models to their peers and left their mark on the College in their graduation year. Together with teachers and fellow students, Momina and Aymen helped coordinate events such as Harmony Day; the Jeans for Genes Day and Pakistan Flood Relief fundraisers and the annual pre-Ramadan picnic.

Several important co-curricular projects were also initiated in 2010, which in time and with support have the potential to greatly benefit the College community. These projects have included the waste reduction and recycling initiative spear headed by the year 12 Health students and Mr Dylan Chown; collaboration with Primary in the school values survey and steps towards adopting a 'Health Promoting Schools' framework.

Academically, it's been a big year. The year 9 NAPLAN results were all well above the national benchmarks in every aspect of literacy and numeracy; congratulations are due to teachers and

students for this excellent achievement. As this report goes to print, our thoughts are with our senior students in wishing them success as they complete final pieces of assessment and await the news of their OPs.

With the implementation of the National Curriculum on the horizon, adjustment of work programs and curriculum has been undertaken in several areas. In 2010, Head of Science, Dr. Fuller,

successfully implemented a new year 12 Chemistry course, while also coordinating the UQ Science Ambassador program. Head of Mathematics, Ms. Ali, has been equally busy, writing the Maths A and B work programs for the new syllabus. As Head of Year 12, Ms. Ali has again tirelessly assisted seniors to organise and fundraise extensively for their end of year formal dinner.

ADMIN

The English Department Head and Head of Year 11, Mr. Vincent Parry, took on the challenge as a trial school for the new QSA Senior English Syllabus and was successful in gaining approval for the new work program for senior English. This complements his implementation of government proscribed Year 10 English Guidelines and other forward planning to accommodate the new National Curriculum changes. In this context, the professionalism and experience of senior English teacher, Di Ross has also been a great asset to the department and students. The English Department is very active in promoting academic competition and achievement through events such as the Public Speaking Competition and Writing Competition.

Supporting the English Department's efforts is the College's ESL Department, coordinated by Ms. Vinita Sharma. The ever – innovative ESL department implemented an iPod project this year where each student was given their own device to promote and assist student learning. The project has many cross-curricula benefits and was well received by students and parents.

On the topic of technology, the Head of Year 9 and IT teacher, Ms Amanda Dunn, conducted a series of robotics workshops for secondary students in July. This hands-on, hi-tech project taught students how to program robots to move. Together with IT and Graphics teacher Mr. Zahid Khan, Ms. Dunn also conducted a series of workshops for students, teachers and parents on the topic of internet safety, providing valuable advice and information to the whole school community. With the introduction of Graphics in secondary, Mr. Khan and Ms. Dunn, who also teaches mathematics passed on a tremendous amount of technical knowledge and skill to students through creative instruction in programs such as Adobe Flash animation.

Students have benefitted from the dedication and thoroughness of Ms Marvan Sattler and Ms. Wong as key teachers in Studies of Society and the Environment and Senior Geography. There is an emphasis on practical learning experiences in their approach, and Ms. Wong put a lot of effort into enhancing teaching and learning with several great excursions and workshops. Some

examples of this included; the Year 8 SOSE incursion - a visit by the Living History group to learn about life and events in the Middle Ages; the Year 9 SOSE incursion – a visit by Australian

Electoral Commission to explain the role of government, democracy, and the electoral process; the Year 10 Excursion to the Coca Cola Amatil Factory to study manufacturing and distribution processes and the Year 11 and Year 12 Geography field trips through the Numinbah Valley and Mt Tambourine rainforest to collect primary data for report writing. Although departing ICB at the end of the year, Ms. Sattler will leave behind an expertly designed curriculum in these subject areas. Field trips are always popular with students. With so many senior students wishing to pursue

further study and careers in science, no doubt their experiences in biology with Ms Dean have helped inspire their decision. Again the practical component, in most part the coastal field trip, seems like a lot of fun, although all involved attest to the hard work in organizing and conducting this research field trip. In a similar way, Physics teacher Mr Darko Bašić has found innovative ways to teach and assess his subject area at the senior level. Forgoing previous years trips to

Dreamworld to research the effects of speed and gravity on rides such as the 'Giant Drop' physics students built electrical circuit models and even measured the range and trajectory of their own gas powered rockets. Continuing on this theme of practical learning, Business Studies and

Economics coordinator Ms Prasad, again conducted the Year 9 Business Venture project. Science and mathematics teacher, Ms Shahra Byrne was very supportive in this initiative, donating her classroom as a business center for the project and giving students much assistance in becoming budding entrepreneurs for a day.

Health and Physical Education (HPE) and Sport at ICB are headed up by Mr Dylan Chown (HPE Head of Department, Head of Year 10) and Mrs Irina Mamino (Secondary Sports Coordinator, Head of Year 8). By training and coordinating other staff, Mr Chown and Mrs Mamino have

continued to improve and build on the delivery of in-school and inter-school sports. The competitive element of in-school sport is based on Wednesday afternoon sporting fixtures amongst the three House groups and accumulation of points throughout the year. At the time of writing this report, the overall winner is yet to be decided, although a big thank you is owed to Ms. Mamino for the 'Shin pads to Hijabs' Football program for girls; and to Mr Chown for the annual Coach Approach

Activities and exceptional work in conducting the annual series of anti-bullying workshops. These anti-bullying workshops are supported by highly respected academic, Professor Bruce Beresford and the highly acclaimed year 11 Health students! Outside of the school, the Islamic College of Brisbane was also represented at a number of District and Regional Competitions for Cross

Country and Touch Football as well as the Madrasah Cup Queensland for boys' soccer and cricket. Space doesn't allow for mention of every event and contribution made by students and staff here. However, on reflection what is noticeable is the way teachers go that 'extra mile' and contribute well above and beyond what is asked of them. This is often done out of hours, at a sacrifice to time spent with family and friends. It is this exceptional work that creates the opportunity for young

people to be exceptional and strive towards a better future. In closing, I offer my sincere thanks to the secondary teaching staff and encouragement to students to value the great opportunities that life, education, family and friendship will provide.





The recent charity dinner for Pakistan, hosted by the college was an enormous success. We managed to raise over \$60,000 on the night and most of the funds were distributed by MCF & some funds sent directly to Pakistan by some individuals. Alhamdulillah this year the team of five dedicated Islamic staff and three Arabic staff tried their utmost best to deliver sound education to our students. Many activities were held to enhance our student's spirituality. In the Secondary levels a pattern is followed to complete the recitation of the Quraan-Kareem. The Malik Fahd Islamic reader was instated as the Islamic textbook to unify all class levels whilst teachers used other resources to improvise and enhance the quality of lessons. Our students performed exceptionally well in both the inter -college and the ICQ Quran competitions alhamdulillah.

Our Friday Khutbas are designed to inculcate within our students good moral ethics whilst care is taken to keep them informed and interested at the same time. Besides the Imams few students also took part in preparing and delivering the Jummah talk this year. Our college had the privilege to welcome an international reciter, Qari Sadaqat Ali. After reciting a heart rendering recitation he advised students to take more interest in Quran studies and to master the art of Tajweed.

Few weeks thereafter we were addressed by another distinguished guest Brother Mujtaba Imraan Siddique.He is well known for interfaith dialogue. He had our students alert with his many questions. Our students were very involved this year in raising funds for the less fortunate. \$40370 was raised for Palestine by our Primary students. Thanks to Mrs Zeena Auckland whom organized the project. Inshallah I will be distributing this amount in December to Palestinian orphans.

A considerable amount was also donated by our school community For the Pakistani Floods and I think it appropriate to give a report on my recent trip to the affected areas of Pakistan.

A TRIP AMIDST THE FLOOD VICTIMS OF PAKISTAN

I had the opportunity to serve the flood victims on behalf of M.C.F (Muslim Charitable Foundation of Queensland Australia. It was indeed a great privilege to be on this trip and it was nevertheless, a truly thrilling experience. After spending a whole day in Karachi, changing currencies and buying goods we set off for two badly affected areas, Thatta and Sajawal. With hundreds displaced and havoc on the streets it was difficult to decide where to start. However, a non-profit organization known as HANDS (Health and Nutrition



Development Society) advised us and gave us a briefing as to how we should operate. This day was long and tiring as we spent it distributing food and aid.

However, one of the greatest achievements in these areas was the establishment of five schools. We purchased mats, tents and blackboards to accommodate hundreds of over enthusiastic children. Many hours were spent teaching them and it was a spectacular sight indeed. Later on, a follow up showed that the numbers increased and volunteer teachers were dedicated. A few manual sewing machines were also donated and many girls are learning how to sew. The operation completed with a survey of the damaged areas.

Seeing the orchards, homes and livestock all leveled to the ground brought tears to the eyes, and the pitiful situation of hundreds of women sitting with their suckling babies on the barrier between the rivers made us more emotional. Much aid was given by me personally on this day.

A few days passed and now we were making our way towards the north of Pakistan. I flew to Islamabad and the very next morning I was on the road to Peshawar. After

short stops in many villages we were in the mountain passes heading to the swat valley. The six hour journey provided us with a wider picture of the damage caused by the floods; factories were washed away, light poles uprooted, bridges broken and a usual sight of cars overturned in the water. Moreover, we were fortunate enough to be in contact with the military of the area that facilitated all our operations.

From the Malakand pass onwards we were escorted by military personnel to an American based camp. We were seated in helicopters and our aid was loaded by dedicated soldiers. Minutes later we were soaring high above the Himalayan ice capped mountains with a breath taking view of the valleys below decorated with pine trees and streams of water. We occasionally waved at groups of kids on hilltops waiting for something since they are isolated from everyone due to the badly destructed roads. We stopped in many villages and were greeted with warmth and love. The next several days were spent visiting effected people and trying to help in whichever way possible.

However, a great danger the people from Arkot (a small village situated in Swat) faced was that new streams were making their way into the area destroying everything in the way. A small amount was given to hire bulldozers to create a barrier. The people were so grateful that they all walked me from one village to another in appreciation and upon my departure to Karachi, an army general of Swat presented me with a glass medal, the shield of honor.

This trip was indeed very beneficial. My courage was mainly due to all your support as a Brisbane and Gold Coast community.

The last leg of this journey was to Sukkur. It brought back many memories since it was here where as a young boy I would attend the discourses of ______

a great Saint. Sukkur is known as the city of Saints. It was ruled by Alexander the great and it was inhabited by many warriors.

The British built the world's largest barrage here on the Indus River. The Sukkur



Barrage has **66** Gates. It controls one of the largest irrigation systems in the world.

Construction of the bridge was started in 1923 and completed in January 1932. The 5,000 feet (1,500 m) long barrage is made of yellow stone and steel and can water nearly 10 million acres (40,000 km) of farmland through its seven large canals. Some of the canals are larger than the Suez Canal. Through God's mercy the city was saved by inches of overflow of the Indus River. Despite this narrow escape the villages around were not spared. I alongside some volunteers began to pack everyday groceries in packages for distribution.

The next morning two trucks set out in different directions for distribution. Our truck was heading for Shikarpur. The road was closed and it meant sitting several hours in the heat on the side of the road. When we finally got going we realized the delay was because of several Nato trucks set alight by locals. The fire was intense, we reached the camps and hundreds of needy people received aid in a very organized manner.



Besides the parcels cash was also handed out to many

handicapped victims. This trip was completed with leading the Friday prayers at an old but grand Mosque at the side of the Indus River.



As a Muslim aid helper I realized how many non Muslims dedicated their time and efforts for this noble cause from around the world. It amazed me how we all can unite in the face of adversities. As an Imam and religious leader I always encourage my community to be charitable beyond creed race or religion.

As a final word I would like to say, Pakistan faced a series of challenges since its inception and every time it overpowered all its dilemmas by dint of its resilient, brave and hard working people. Whether it was the re-settlement in 1947, or the war in 1965 or the earthquake in 2005, the brave nation countered the challenges

successfully. Pakistani bravery is legendary. The people of Pakistan know how to re-construct hopes and create smiles on the faces of the distressed.

The rescue and relief work has mostly been accomplished. What is most needed now is the rehabilitation of the nation. The winter is approaching and they need proper shelters. I wish to begin a few projects in this regard and re visit in January to monitor all progress. I would love to thank the community who so generously donated and most importantly M.C.F that I represented.



First I did a collage with diamonds and squares. Then I made a Japanese fan with paddlepop sticks. Then I played parachute games. Last I made a dreamcatcher.






NUMINBAH VALLEY

How do cyclones occur?


A cyclone is a type of natural disaster. It can cause a lot of death and destruction. A cyclone can travel to speeds of up to 350km/h and they usually start in the tropics.

Before a cyclone starts the right place and right temperature is needed. The sea surface temperature needs to be 26.5C or above. In stage one, low air pressure pulls the clouds in and they rotate. Then, clouds will rotate a lot, but might not form a full cyclone.

In the northern hemisphere, the cyclone season is June-November and in the southern hemisphere it is November-May.

The most famous cyclones are Cyclone Mahina (Bathurst Bay), Cyclone Tracy (Darwin), Cyclone Larry (Innisfail) and Cyclone Fran (Bundaberg). The most disastrous cyclone in Australia was Cyclone Tracy and it happened in Darwin. It was going at the speed of 205km/h (125mph).

Cyclones are very, very destructive. Did you know in the Atlantic Ocean they call cyclones 'hurricanes'?



How do you make a road?

A road is a way, path or course that is used by people and motor vehicles. Roads are made through a process that uses bitumen, cement, and gravel.

The planning or designing of a road takes at least 7 years. They first have to scoop out where the road might be. After that they have to determine the width and length of the road. Then they lay out the designs or plans of the road.

When the council workers are done with the designing they start constructing. They first clear all the trees if there are any and they also put devices to keep the dirt from washing away. Then the workers pour the hot bitumen onto the surface of the earth, to make the road. They cover the bitumen with sand or grit to stop a car's wheel from skiing away. The workers then roll the road with a steamroller. After that the road is nearly finished.

When the road is dry they put white lines to tell which way is which. Then the road is finished.

The road is then opened and transportation vehicles can drive on it. Wow. The longest road in the world is called the Pan-American Highway.







As part of its obligations towards funding bodies, IWAQ has to provide on an annual basis, audited financial statements as well as performance reports. IWAQ is considered as one of the best organisations in managing its funding according to the strict guidelines. The organisation does not rely on community fund-raising for the provision of services.
