## **Islamic College of Brisbane Annual Report 2026 *(Based on 2025 data)***

The Islamic College of Brisbane is an independent co-educational school offering education from Prep to Year 12.

The Islamic College of Brisbane (ICB) caters to a richly diverse student population that reflects the multicultural fabric of the broader Brisbane community. The majority of students come from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds, with many from non-English speaking households. In 2025, the College enrolled over 1,700 students, comprising a near-even distribution of male and female students. While most students were born in Australia, they share heritage across a wide range of cultural and ethnic backgrounds, contributing to the College's vibrant and inclusive atmosphere.

Approximately 1,712 students were enrolled in 2025, representing a continued growth from 1,693 in 2024.

The Islamic College of Brisbane is a co-educational, faith-based institution located in Karawatha, Queensland. The College is dedicated to the holistic development of students through a balanced education grounded in Islamic values and principles. The curriculum integrates academic, spiritual, social, and physical development, with strong emphasis on the Quran and Hadith as foundations for moral and ethical growth.

The school's vision is to nurture future leaders who are academically equipped, spiritually grounded, and socially responsible. To achieve this, ICB offers a comprehensive educational program, including a strong religious studies component, rigorous academic disciplines in the sciences and humanities, and vibrant extracurricular opportunities including sports, student leadership, and cultural engagement.
